 my personal favorite,

 the parking lot will be

 we'll be ready for our

We celebrate  
 Reformation Day the last  
 Sunday of October,  
 remembering that 31<sup>st</sup>  
 day of October in 1517

when Luther posted his  
 thoughts in Wittenburg.  
 Expecting to have a lively  
 debate over the issues,  
 he nor anyone else  
 thought it would spark a  
 revolution in theology  
 and practice. There had  
 been movements in the  
 church and in Christian  
 theology before.  
 Humanism, mysticism,  
 even nationalism set the  
 stage for a return to the  
 foundation of the  
 Christian faith – but those  
 inward-directed  
 movements reached for  
 human reason and effort.

That foundation of  
 Christianity? Faith, not  
 works. In a nutshell, the  
 Reformation was about  
 throwing over the works-  
 righteousness the church  
 had by then  
 institutionalized, in its  
 structure that had made  
 princes out of

bishops and a virtual king  
 out of the man chosen to  
 head the church, in its  
 never-ceasing demand for  
 money to fund that  
 structure, in the pressure  
 it put upon the people  
 not to be what Christ asks  
 in scripture, but to do  
 what the church  
 demanded of them.  
 Reformation reached not  
 inward for human  
 inspiration and control,  
 but toward the hand of  
 Christ and His authority.

That was the great  
 threat Luther posed to the  
 church at the time - a loss  
 of authority. Ultimately,  
 Christ has authority over  
 His church on earth.  
 Sinful men and women, of  
 course, will get in the way  
 of that heavenly  
 leadership and lead folks  
 astray, that's human  
 nature.

## Community Outreach Study

But the Reformation was about getting tradition and earthly sinfulness out of the way of God's people as they worship. Part of that was eliminating the hierarchy of church leadership, which is why we Missouri Synod Lutherans have so much local control in our parishes. Part of that was stripping away the traditions that had supplanted scripture over the years, for example, the cult of Mary as a saint to be worshipped and prayed through, which was not a scriptural teaching about that great woman but a human and traditional view of her.

A major change we can trace directly to Luther and Reformation is the placement of scripture back in the hands of the worshipping people. An interesting intersection of history can be seen in the spread of the printing press just as Luther was beginning to preach and write and translate scripture. We still teach the Catechism Luther wrote, and with good reason – it is a great way to learn about what is in the Bible. Luther's Six Chief Parts (the Sacraments, the Lord's Prayer, the Commandments, the Creed, and Confession) are completely scriptural in nature and important for worshipping Christians to understand.

And we celebrate the return of music to the church coincident with the theological reformation of Luther's day. What a joy to welcome back our choirs as a regular part of our worship service beginning this month, alongside the more contemporary sound of our quartet, Ablaze. We look forward to the seasonal sounds of the Cantata, horns, strings – all the joyful noises God's people can bring to His church.

So hurry back, if you aren't already here. Let's have some fun as the season changes. God's richest blessings upon you all!

## From the President

It is once again time for the "active" part of the Church year at Crown of Life to begin. Many of you are back from your extended summer "up north" and the balance will return soon. We are gearing up for all types of activities such as Oktoberfest, new Bible classes, Voters' meetings, committee meetings, two Worship services on Sunday (beginning October 30), and all of the other things that are a part of our "normal" church lives at Crown of Life. Remember always as you participate in any of these activities to ask yourself if perhaps you should invite a neighbor or friend to go with you and be a part of that activity as well.

One of the things that is happening is the re-structuring of our Constitution and Bylaws. This is an exercise of placing the items in these documents in a different part of the document, or perhaps moving the item from the Constitution to the Bylaws or vice versa to better align with the suggested order of things as outlined by either District or Synod. For the most part moving them around does not change their function. As you know, changes to the Constitution require readings at two successive Voters' Meetings with voter approval after the second reading, and Bylaw changes to be read and approved at one Voters' Meeting.

Then as a separate item for Voter consideration is a motion to allow members of either sex to hold any office other than Pastor or Elder. This is accordance with a resolution adopted by Synod some time ago. It is not required but is an acceptable option. Because of the possibility that this may create excessive discussion, I am scheduling an Open Forum meeting to be held during the Bible class hour on Sunday morning November 13. The Voter's Meeting is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, November 20 at 2:00 PM. This scheduling will allow for travel and/or family gatherings for Thanksgiving the following weekend. Please plan to attend.

At the September Church Council meeting the Council approved a request from the Board of Trustees to spend budgeted money to re-surface the parking lot and also to spend budgeted money to re-paint the exterior of the Church.

It will also be a part of the order of business to establish a call procedure for sending an official call to Vicar Gary after he is ordained next spring. This was part of the package when we agreed to his enrolling in the Pastoral Training program a couple of years ago. All of the details will be explained at the Voters' Meeting.

One last item is to remind you that the November meeting will have two important items on the agenda, namely approving the budget for 2012 and electing new officers as directed in our Constitution.

# A Moment with Pastor Phill



## To change or not to change

One of the issues coming to the Voters' Assembly on November 20 at 2:00 PM is whether or not to change the wording in our church constitution to allow women as well as men to serve as President of the Congregation. Currently, only men may hold that position. We have been asked by the Pacific Southwest District constitution committee to make the change, which will bring us in line with the Missouri Synod's position on the issue, decided in national convention. Here's a short time line of Synod action in this area:

### 1969

The 1969 synodical convention adopted Resolution 2-17 "To Grant Woman Suffrage and Board Membership." This resolution states: Those statements of Scripture which direct women to keep silent in the church and which prohibit them to teach and to exercise authority over men, we understand to mean that women ought not to hold the pastoral

office or serve in any other capacity involving the distinctive functions of this office. The resolution then concludes with these words: We therefore conclude that the Synod itself and the congregations of the Synod are at liberty to alter their policies and practices in regard to women's involvement in the work of the church according to these declarations, provided the polity developed conforms to the general Scriptural principles that women neither hold the pastoral office nor "exercise authority over men."

### 1994

The Synod Committee on Theology and Church Relations published a report titled *The Service of Women in Congregational and Synodical Offices*. There is a copy in my office, if anyone would like to see it. Essentially CTCR held that there are two kinds of offices in the church, those established *iure divino*, that is, by divine writ in His Scripture, and those established *iure humano*, that is offices established by people, not discussed in scripture, for the purposes of administering God's growing church on earth.

### 2004

The Synod, at its convention, adopted the conclusions of the 1994 CTCR report. Synod decided that women may hold any office established *iure humano*, such as President, Vice-President, etc. – offices not described in Scripture - so long as the positions do not involve the public ministry in the church, such as preaching, administering the sacraments, and the office of the keys. Those duties are reserved for men, per scripture (1Timothy 3, for example), and are offices established *iure divino* such as pastor and elder. True, there are some LCMS churches in which women hold the title "Elder", but they do not function as do our Elders at Crown of Life, that is, serving communion and exercising authority over the pastor of our church as does the Board of Elders here. The resolution we will be voting on specifically excludes women serving as pastors or elders, as you would expect.

### 2008

Pacific Southwest District, in reviewing our church constitution, requests that we amend our constitution to reflect Synod policy expressed in the '04 Synodical Convention.

There are other ways of looking at the issue. You might remember that at the last Voters' Assembly, in May, we asked that written comments be submitted regarding the proposed changes to our church constitution. We received one, objecting to the change in policy in our church on scriptural grounds. Take a look at 1Timothy 2:12, Paul speaking, and informing Timothy that Paul does not allow women to teach or to exercise authority over men in the church. Our member reads that to include the "temporal" authority the Church Council has over the pastor of our church, for example in matters such as schedule, salary, duties outside the church services, etc. The office of President of the Congregation, therefore, would be outside the scope of

scripturally-allowed service for women in the church. Our member, essentially, rejects the *iure divino/iure humano* logic the Synod applied to the question in reaching its conclusions, for the reason that Paul assumed no such distinction in disallowing women to have authority over men in the church.

And there is the "cultural" issue – it is possible that some of our male members would not care to serve on a church council led by a female in the highest elected office. That may be a generational issue, as some of us have simply never had a woman "boss", certainly a much more common phenomenon in the current work force in America.

As a practical matter, Lutheran schools decide the issue each time they hire a female principal to supervise a teaching staff of both males and females. The only way that could happen is if a school and its church determine the office of Principal falls outside Paul's strictures in 1 Timothy, which is akin to the Synod decision that some jobs in the church are *iure divino* and some are *iure humano*.

My opinion is that we as a church do no wrong to adopt the Synod policy allowing women to serve as President of our congregation. That, too, may be a generational thing – by the time I came to the LCMS, the discussion about who gets to vote in the church had been decided, and both genders were voting. About the time I became a church administrator the 1994 CTCR document was published. I'm certain that my late arrival in the church, after women were voting in most LCMS churches and previously all-male positions were beginning to be looked at differently, does indeed color my perception of the issue. Others of longer standing may see the issue as a "slippery slope", starting down the path the ELCA has taken to startling ends.

The differences of opinion inherent in any substantive change are exactly why we have chosen to create a stand-alone resolution of this gender eligibility issue. You'll recall one of our resolutions in November is a re-structure of our existing constitution, not to change it but to make it easier to use. The change in structure of our constitution will be voted on separately from this man/woman President of the Congregation issue. We will hold a brief Towne Meeting on Sunday, November 13, at 9:15 AM so that questions may be asked about any of the five issues coming to the Voters on November 20<sup>th</sup>. You will have all Voters' Assembly materials in hand the weekend of November 5 and 6 so you will have time to review the issues. And I invite you to call me directly if you have concerns or questions. I'm not unbiased, I admit – but I'm ready to talk to you.

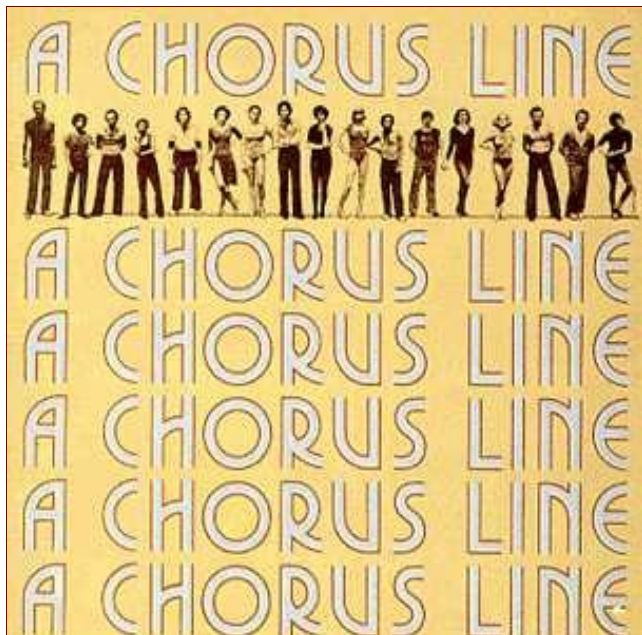

This month we will highlight the reply from our contribution to CRC ministries in India by printing excerpts from Rev. Sam Thompson's letter thanking us for the contribution.

"As you may know CRC ministries is a Lutheran outreach focusing its ministry in the rural parts of south India and least evangelized North India. Our target group is aged from 4-25 years. We carry out our ministry through personal evangelism, weekly Home Bible Study Clubs, conferences, VBSs, Gospel Puppet shows, musical events and the like. Each year we share the gospel with more than ten thousand people. CRC operates with two full-time missionaries and about fifty volunteer workers to spread the good news. India, with less than 3% of Christian population, is one of the least evangelized countries in the world today. India is a multi-religious country having all the major and minor religions represented among its population. The majority religion in India is Hinduism, 80% of the population. And in midst of opposition and various challenges the mission work in India is growing steadily. We are glad that God is using us each day in this country. 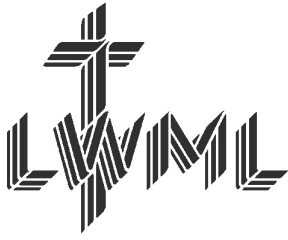

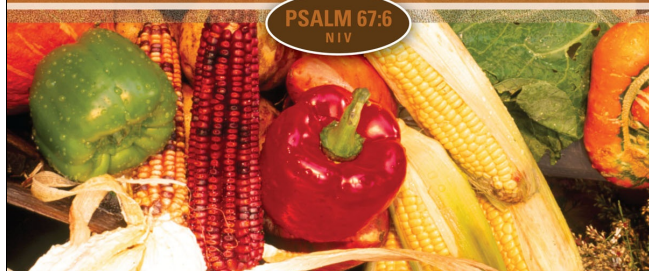
